# THE BAND OF THE ROYAL REGIMENT OF SCOTLAND

THE BAND OF THE ROYAL REGIMENT OF SCOTLAND is a full-time marching band and symphonic wind band within the British Army, based in Edinburgh, Scotland. The Band provides year-round musical support for many Scottish Regimental and British Army events, in addition to numerous State ceremonial occasions that occur in Scotland. This includes Gun Salutes, Garden Parties, State Banquets and Guards of Honour at The Palace of Holyrood House, and Edinburgh, Stirling and Balmoral Castles.

Despite the Scottish soldier being inextricably linked with the imagery of Pipes and Drums, there is a long tradition of marching military bands in Scotland. Scottish music tradition dates back many centuries to when Clan Chieftains would employ Seannachies (Bards) to record their triumphs in music and song. It is recorded as early as 1763 that there was a Band of the Royal Regiment of Foot, which would later become The Royal Scots, antecedents of the current First Battalion. Whilst all members of the Band are full time musicians, they are also fully trained soldiers. In 2003, many members of the band served in Iraq, working in support of 33 and 202 Field Hospitals and were instrumental in the building of the British Military Hospital at Shaibah. The Band were also deployed to Afghanistan during Op Herrick 15 to boost troop morale by performing musical activities over the Remembrance, Christmas and New Year period.

The Band continues to assert itself as a leader within the world of military music, notably by routinely being featured as a mainstay of the world-renowned Royal Edinburgh Military Tattoo occurring annually for a month over the Summer and playing to millions of people from across the world.

During the last two years the Band have performed at many high-profile events with the most notable being the Funeral of HM Queen Elizabeth II and the Coronation of King Charles III along with the presentation of the Honours of Scotland to HM the King. They have also travelled to France, Germany, Switzerland and England.

#### MAJ BRENDEN WHEELER (RCAM) DIRECTOR OF MUSIC OF THE BAND OF THE ROYAL REGIMENT OF SCOTLAND



Brenden hails from Cairns, Australia where his passion for brass playing began in the tropical climate of Far North Queensland. With strong encouragement from his parents, he began playing the trombone and euphonium at the age of 9. At the age of 15, Brenden was selected to perform at the Opening Ceremony of the 2000 Olympic Games held in Sydney and later that year was

appointed Principal Trombone of the North Queensland Philharmonic Orchestra.

Brenden began his tertiary education at the Queensland Conservatorium of Music in Brisbane in 2003. During this time, he established his musical links with the Brisbane Excelsior Band and was part of the band's first historic victory at the Australian National Championships in which he went on to retain for three consecutive years. In September 2004, Brenden won a scholarship and moved to the UK to continue his studies at the University of Salford with leading brass educationalist and fellow Australian, Professor David King. He quickly established himself in the UK brass music scene and only six months after his arrival, won the prestigious 2005 BBC Radio 2 Young Brass Soloist title.

As a soloist, Brenden has won many awards; including the Grenland International Best Soloist Award in Norway; and has performed at the UK's premiere venues and toured extensively throughout Europe and Asia and featured as a soloist on many recordings.

Brenden joined the British Army in 2009 to become a professional musician within the Royal Corps of Army Music (RCAM). After completing training, he was posted to his first military band The Heavy Cavalry & Cambrai Band in Catterick, North Yorkshire. Three years later, Brenden attended the Royal Military Academy Sandhurst and commissioned into RCAM. On completion of the Young Officers' Course at the Royal Military School of Music in Twickenham, 2Lt Wheeler was assigned as the Assistant Director of Music at The Band and Bugles of the Rifles. He was then subsequently assigned to the Army Foundation College in Harrogate as Officer Commanding 2 Platoon, where his platoon won the prestigious Mallon Trophy award for the best platoon in Waterloo Company. In 2017, Captain Wheeler was appointed as Director of Music at The Band of the Royal Armoured Corps and managed the transition to British Army Band Catterick under the Military Music Optimisation programme in 2019. In 2020, Major Wheeler attended the staff course in Shrivenham before being assigned as SO2 |35 within Permanent |oint Headquarters as part of the team responsible for the acceleration of the Afghan Relocations and Assistance Policy. In 2021, Major Wheeler was assigned to a [5 appointment at joint Force Command Naples, Italy before returning to the UK as the Director of Music for the Band of the Royal Regiment of Scotland in August 2023.

Brenden lives with his wife Katrina and two daughters Gabriella and Eva along with their loyal Labrador Nero in Edinburgh. In their spare time, the family like to travel, ski, and spend the summer months wakeboarding.

**KEVIN GOWLAND** is Head of Wind, Brass and Percussion, Director of Woodwind and Senior Flute Tutor at the RNCM.

His career started at the age of 22, when he was appointed as Flute Section Leader with The City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra by Sir Simon Rattle, a position he held for 17 years before moving to the Orchestra of Opera North as Principal Flute. He has appeared as Guest Principal Flute with the LSO, RPO, Academy of St. Martin

in the Fields, Philharmonia, Halle, RLPO, RSNO, BBC Symphony Orchestra, BBC Philharmonic and BBC NOW.

Kevin has appeared as a concerto soloist on many occasions, collaborating with Valery Gergiev, Sir Simon Rattle, Sakari Oramo,



SIMON HOGG A graduate of the National Youth Orchestra, the Royal Academy of Music, London and Birmingham University, Simon Hogg became a founder member of The Fine Arts Brass Ensemble in 1980. During this time the ensemble performed two thousand concerts, visited over sixty countries throughout the world, recorded 150 BBC radio/TV broadcasts and made 25

commercial recordings. Fine Arts Brass Ensemble commissioned seventy original works by leading British composers and performed at most major British and European music festivals.

In 1994 Simon founded Warwick Music, a specialist music publisher, commencing with an unknown work for Trombone & Organ (1894) by Gustav Holst which he discovered in the British Museum. It was Simon's original concept that led to the Warwick Music's manufacture of the world's first plastic trombone the pBone.

In 1996 Simon was made an Associate of the Royal Academy of Music (ARAM), only awarded to alumni who have distinguished

Paavo Jarvi, Sir Mark Elder, Christian Gansch, Nicholas McGegan, Nicholas Kraemer and Richard Farnes, covering a wide spectrum of the flute concerto repertoire.

A busy recitalist, Kevin has broadcast live on BBC Radio 3 and appeared at the Purcell Room; Symphony Hall, Birmingham; The Royal Opera House, Covent Garden; The Cheltenham Festival; the NFA 2019 in Salt Lake City three times, with invitations to play at the Dallas and Washington Conventions and gave the first solo recital in the inaugural week of events at The Howard Assembly Room, Leeds.

Kevin has been an adjudicator for the televised Woodwind final of BBC Young Musician of the Year, the NFA Young Soloist Competition, The British Flute Society, Gregynog Young Musicians and has given Masterclasses at RCM, RBC, RWCMD, SOTA (Singapore) and University of Music, Trossingen.

Simon has performed, lectured and examined at conservatoires around the world. He taught at the Royal College of Music, Junior Department for ten years and adjudicated the BBC Young Musician of the Year Competition. He has been a Senior External Examiner at: the Royal Scottish Academy of Music & Drama, Royal Birmingham Conservatoire and Chetham's School of Music. In 2014 he was honoured with an award from the British Trombone Association and nominated for the Classic FM Music Teacher of the Year Award.

Simon has performed with orchestras throughout the world including: The City of Birmingham Orchestra (with Simon Rattle), The English Symphony Orchestra and The Czech Philharmonic Orchestra.

He was Director of Music at Warwick School, leading a staff of sixty music teachers and organising 750 music lessons every week. He is currently visiting professor at the Benedetto Marcello Conservatoire in Venice. When time permits he enjoys: reading, golf and all things Italian.



**PAUL HORNSBY** began his musical life studying flute with Stanley Gleave (BBC Welsh Symphony Orchestra) in 1972 before gaining a place at Dartington Hall to study flute and composition. Whilst here he developed a keen interest in

electronic and experimental music making. Returning to Wales in 1978 he took up a position as an instrumental woodwind tutor and freelance musician. Studying the saxophone led to more diverse playing work. He joined the Welsh Jazz Orchestra during the mid 1980's performing with many international and UK based jazz musicians includeding Lew Tabakin (Flute/Saxophone), Bobby Shew (Trumpet/Flugal), Pete King (Alto Saxophone) and many others. Freelance work led to tours abroad (United Arab Emirates, Europe and the UK). Other work included television and recording contracts for the BBC, S4C and independent film producers. His own recording facility was created during the late 1980's and led to composition commissions for BBC 2, S4C and Sky Networks.

His work at Gwent Music Support Service gave him many opportunities to develop his directing skills. In recent years this has produced more than 35 National Awards (National Concert Band Festival and National Festival of Music for Youth) for a diverse range of ensembles as well as significant successes in the field of Orchestral Wind Orchestras and Contemporary Jazz Ensembles. In both of these areas he's been responsible for commissioning and premiering major works by leading composers (including Tim Garland, Stan Sulzmann, Nikki Illes) as well as working alongside leading exponents in their fields (Gerard McChrystal, Hugh McDowell, Dave O'Higgins, Alan Barnes, Jim Mullen, Percy Pursglove and others) His music directing has led to his ensembles performing in some of the very best concert halls in the UK.

International tours have included New Zealand, Australia, California, Germany, France and Italy.

During the early 2000's he was invited to become an A Level examiner for EdExcel (Music Technology) prior to this his work at Gwent Music Support Service led him to become the Head of Woodwind Team and later to become Senior Assistant Head of Service and eventually Deputy Head of Service. Recently his work here allowed him to establish an elite team of Senior Instrumental Tutors to form the S.O.T.A.L team (Standards of Teaching and Learning). This team was responsible for quality assurance across all disciplines as well as providing support and mentoring to all instrumental and vocal tutors.

Additional work has given Paul the opportunity to provide Workshops and INSET training both locally (Wales) and further afield.Paul chaired the steering panel for National Youth Jazz Wales at Ty Cerdd.

In 2013, he retired from his work at GMSS to follow a freelance music career.

**BARRIE JOHNSON** was born in Newcastle-upon-Tyne, gaining early musical experiences through Salvation Army brass bands and choirs, his playing career included being principal euphonium with bands in Newcastle & Kettering.

He has also featured on tenor horn, tuba and trombone with bands in London, Kettering and Birmingham, including City of London

Brass. During this time he also took part in performance tours to Norway and Canada, featured on radio and LP recordings and performed in many major concert venues throughout the UK. Barrie has been conducting school, youth and community groups in all musical genres for many years.

As a school music teacher, he has taught in primary, middle and secondary schools, heading up very successful music and expressive arts departments for over 35 years, retiring as Director of Music at Northampton School for Boys in 2015 after 14 years in post.

Directing groups, including Wind Bands and Big Bands, from 3 different schools to regular top award-winning performances at the National Concert Band Festival and the National Festival of Music for Youth, programming challenging music, was key to raising standards and student aspiration. It also allowed him to direct performances in some of the country's top performance venues including Symphony Hall, Birmingham, Royal Albert Hall and Royal Festival Hall, London, and The Sage, Gateshead.

At NSB, he formed two community bands - Cripps Hall Jazz Orchestra and East Midlands Wind Orchestra - as exemplars to further raise aspirations in the school's top groups. Regular successful performance jazz tours for his Big Band and Jazz Vocal Group, to New York, Los Angeles and Florida were also organised to further raise standards by partnering with high performance American school groups and receiving coaching from such international stars as Gordon Goodwin, Eric Marienthal, Wayne Bergeron, Jeff Jarvis, Chuck Owen and Tom Brantley.

As well as school groups he has also conducted many area and county youth bands (both brass and wind), community bands and choirs, and has conducted groups, and acted as Musical Director, on a variety of residential holiday music courses.

He has also been involved with IAJE (International Association for Jazz Education), adjudicated regularly at various music festivals and, together with Keith Allen, is responsible for keeping NCBF Repertoire lists and the Criteria Sheet up-to-date and relevant.

Since retiring from full-time teaching he has continued to teach A-level, act as a freelance Music Education consultant, adjudicate, guest conduct, lead workshops/holiday courses and compose and arrange for Wind Band and Big Band.



ED PUDDICK is a full time lecturer the in jazz of department the Royal Birmingham Conservatoire. Before taking up his current role, Ed taught jazz composition and arranging at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama for 14 years. He also sat on the IVORS Academy Jazz Committee for 6 years.

His compositions and arrangements have been

performed by many ensembles, including the BBC Concert Orchestra (featuring Yazz Ahmed), Orquestra de Jazz do Algarve (Portugal), Sydney Jazz Orchestra (Australia), Bradfield College Big Band (featuring Alec Dankworth), and the London Jazz Orchestra. In 2021 Ed recorded the album CRAZY DAYS (ATS-Records) with the Upper Austrian Jazz Orchestra.

In 2018 Ed was awarded the Arranging Prize at the Barga International Jazz Festival with his arrangement of Dizzy Gillespie's Con Alma, performed by US trumpeter Jeremy Pelt and the Festival Orchestra.

Ed has been commissioned to write music for large-scale projects including Back To The Blues (Paul Dunmall, 2023), Movement Inspired (Birmingham 2022 Commonwealth Games), Soultime Again (Paul Dunmall, 2019 – released on Stoney Lane Records, February 2024), One Universal Shout (Bridgewater Hall, 2019), Beyond Wigan Pier (Alan Gregory, 2018), Near Horizons (Joe Allard Commission, 2015) and Secret Music (Music For Youth, 2014).

Other significant works include Saratoga Springs (2011, featuring Australian multi-instrumentalist James Morrison), Only Thelonious Suite (Ed Puddick Big Band, 2017), The Twisted Wheel in 2016 (2016, featuring US saxophonist Eric Marienthal) and Guys & Dolls Suite (2005, Ed Puddick Big Band - released on Diving Duck Records, 2010).

SIMONE REBELLO araduated with Distinction from the Royal Northern College of Music to embark on a career as a solo percussionist that has seen her recording several CDs (the latest with the BBC Singers), touring and broadcasting extensively nationally and internationally

and winning a collection of awards and prizes including Cosmopolitan Woman of the Year in the Performing Arts. She works frequently as a concerto soloist with wind orchestras and brass bands around the world and as a solo recitalist.

Simone is a founder member of BackBeat Percussion Quartet who have won a number of chamber music competitions in the UK, Japan and USA and who continue to tour record and present concerts globally.

Simone appears regularly as a guest performer with a number of ensembles including The Equivox Trio, Ex Cathedra, The Young Voices Band and in a duo with outstanding jazz pianist Jason Rebello. She has worked with artists including Beverley Knight, Alexandra Burke, Tony Hadley and Mika.

In September 2010 Simone was appointed as Director of Percussion at The Royal Northern College of Music, and is also Head of School of Wind, Brass and Percussion.

In addition to performing Simone is an experienced adjudicator of percussion events, wind and brass contests and general music competitions and has judged for such prestigious events as BBC Young Musician of the Year, National Brass Band Championships for New Zealand, Australia, USA, Europe and Switzerland and for the National Concert Band Festivals in UK and Norway.

Simone is frequently invited to present concerts and talks/ lectures/workshops featuring all aspects of percussion and performance.

Simone works regularly as a presenter for events including the European Brass Band Finals, The Brass in Concert Championships from The Sage and the RNCM Festival of Brass including a concert for BBC Radio 2. She has also worked as a presenter for the National Brass Band Finals (Royal Albert Hall),The Great Northern Brass Arts Festival and European and national events for Yamaha. Simone is a solo artist and endorsee for Yamaha Music Europe, Mike Balter Mallets and Sabian Cymbals.



#### ANDY ROGERS

is a music leader. conductor. teacher composer based and Buckinghamshire. in Since 2019, Andy has Director been a at Musica Europa – the specialist tour operator delivering performance opportunities for bands and choirs in Europe and around the world.

Andy grew up in High Wycombe, where he studied tuba and piano. His love of composition led to commissions for bands, orchestras and choirs with notable performances including the London Symphony Orchestra at the Barbican and by massed youth ensembles at the Royal Albert Hall on several occasions. Andy conducted the High Wycombe Music Centre Concert Band for more than 20 years, before taking up a role as Principal of Chiltern Music Academy, where he led their Concert Band to successes at the National Concert Band Festival as well as international performances in Austria, Germany, Italy and France.



PAUL SPEED started the trumpet when he was 10 years old and initially studied at the High Wycombe Music Centre. After completing a music degree at Goldsmiths' College Paul embarked on a

freelance trumpet career that has included orchestral experience with the Hong Kong Philharmonic Orchestra, London Concert Orchestra and the Philharmonie der Nationen based in Germany. As a conductor, Paul is Musical Director of South Berks Concert Band and Trinity Concert Band, both bands based near Reading. Both bands have performed at the NCBF regionals and finals. As well as playing and conducting, Paul enjoys teaching, and his schools include Wellington College, Royal Grammar School, High Wycombe and St Swithun's School in Winchester.

Paul is a keen supporter of the music charity Brass for Africa and has been fortunate enough to spend time over in Kampala, Uganda to see the work that is going on there, changing lives for the better. Paul co-wrote a teaching syllabus to help the young adults of BfA embark on their teaching career.

When Paul has not got a trumpet or baton in his hand he enjoys running, although maybe enjoy is not the right word!



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

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
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
